Get arty in Amsterdam

With private views and access to exclusive collections, an expert-led art tour is an enriching experience. And with the reopening of the Rijksmuseum and Van Gogh Museum last year, Amsterdam is just ripe for exploring. Go drifting in Sweden

With an ex-World Rally Championship instructor at your side, you'll learn how to master a specially modified, 300-brake horsepower 911 rally car with fully studded tyres on a series of meticulously prepared lake circuits lined with snow banks. Once you are au fait with the pendulum-rhythm of drifting, you'll soon be able to slip out of grip and move into a graceful slide - all at breakneck speed, of course. Back to nature in New Zealand



New Zealand is a geological wonderland, with volcanoes, glaciers, and geysers galore.
