Right now I want to feel enlightened. So I would begin in Barcelona, at the Mandarin Oriental. To learn more about economics and creativity. over tapas at the Mercat de Santa Caterina, I'd bring together Ferran Adrià and Thomas Piketty to explore his r>g [returns on capital grow faster than rate of economic growth] theory. It's bound to get molecular. Next, by Gulfstream G650 jet, we'd flit off to the magnificent Botanique hotel in the Valle dos Mellos, near São Paulo, Brazil. Here, I'll meet photographers Sebastião Salgado and Don McCullin to hear their thoughts on conservation, indigenous communities and photography. We'd head up to Fogo Island Inn in Newfoundland, whose conservation policy and connection to its community is exemplary. On the way, in New York at Bemelmans Bar at the Carlyle, I'd catch up with Dr Andrew Johnson, the assistant professor of anthropology at Princeton, to discuss the traveller and technology,

India is where we'd learn more about acceptance, from meeting members of the Gulabi Gang, Arunachalam Muruganantham and perhaps Alain de Botton, who always lends an interesting perspective on most subjects. We'd stay at the epic Devigarh, just outside Udaipur.





Lastly, I'd meet Pico lyer to discuss the art of stillness, at a bespoke camp in Afghanistan's stunning Wakhan Corridor. Hopefully, by the end, I'd better understand the world today. A similar journey with Brown + Hudson (brownandhudson.com) would cost about £850,000 for a party of six.

I'd start in Montana at Triple Creek Ranch, set amid towering pines, either practising roping skills and helping to round up the cattle or trout fishing on the beautiful Bitterroot River. Then I'd head to Yellowstone National Park - with 60 per cent of the world's gevsers, 5,500 bison, 500 black bears. 200 grizzlies and at least 100 wolves - and explore the Lamar Valley, known as the Serengeti of North America. After a couple of nights taking in the wildlife of Las Vegas - the Cirque du Soleil, dinner at Joël Robuchon and breakfast at the Wynn - I'd head to the majestic red cliffs, emerald pools and waterfalls of Zion National Park. Then, heading eastwards through Utah, I'd stay in the sublimely gorgeous Amangiri resort,

My last three nights would be spent at Dunton Hot Springs, the old gold-mining ghost town in Colorado, where Butch Cassidy fled after robbing the bank at Telluride. I'd stay in the beautifully renovated miners' houses, fish on the Dolores West Fork and rest my delightfully weary body in the hot springs, before a gourmet dinner. For me, that's a perfect trip.
